



Area students honored at SkillsUSA National Leadership Conference

KANSAS CITY, Mo. — Students from area high schools and college technical education programs won the nation's highest awards at the SkillsUSA National Leadership and Skills Conference.

Industry leaders representing more than 600 businesses, corporations, trade associations and unions recognized the students for their demonstrated excellence in 99 hands-on occupational and leadership contests, such as robotics, criminal justice, aviation maintenance and public speaking. All contests are designed, run and judged by industry using industry standards.

Top student winners received gold, silver and bronze medallions. Many also received prizes, such as tools of their trade and/or scholarships to further their careers and education. The SkillsUSA Championships is for high school and college-level students who are members of SkillsUSA.

In addition, high scorers in the contests received Skill Point Certificates. The Skill Point Certificate was awarded in 86 occupational and leadership areas to students who achieved a high score defined by industry.

The SkillsUSA Championships have been a premier event since 1967. The Skill Point Certificates were introduced in 2009 as a component of the SkillsUSA Work Force Ready System.

■ Katie Scott of Tyrone, a student at YTI Career Institute, Altoona, was awarded a Skill Point Certificate in Medical Math.

■ Nicole Gill of Hollidaysburg, a student at YTI Career Institute, Altoona,

■ Valerie Chamberlin of Bellwood, a student at Greater Altoona Career & Technology Center, was awarded a Skill Point Certificate in Advertising Design.

"Over 6,000 students from every state in the nation came to compete in the SkillsUSA Championships," said SkillsUSA Executive Director Tim Lawrence. "This is the SkillsUSA partnership at its best. Students, instructors and industry representatives are working together to ensure America has a skilled workforce and every student excels. These students prove that career and technical education expands opportunities."

Industry support of the SkillsUSA Championships is valued at more than \$36 million in donated time, equipment, cash and material. All contests are run and judged by industry experts using industry standards for employment. Contests assess hands-on, employability and academic skills.

More than 1,700 industry judges and technical committee members participated this year.

The SkillsUSA Work Force Ready System was developed as an extension of the SkillsUSA mission and supported by a grant from the W.K. Kellogg Foundation. The system recognizes students for excellence in occupational training; it assesses and documents the entry-level technical proficiency and cumulative experiences of candidates.

Businessman creates endowed scholarship at Pennsylvania Highlands in Huntingdon

JOHNSTOWN — Huntingdon businessman Dale W. Miller has created the first endowed scholarship for the Pennsylvania Highlands Community College Huntingdon Center. The endowment will provide an annual scholarship for a student attending the Penn Highlands Huntingdon Center.

Miller has worked closely with the college since the Huntingdon Center's inception in 2008, providing and renovating space for its operation and working with other community leaders to ensure that the college had everything necessary to be successful.

For the past 63 years, Miller has owned and operated D.W. Miller Inc., a highway construction company. Under his leadership, this company has grown into a very successful business, providing jobs for as many as 300 employees throughout Pennsylvania, Maryland, Virginia and West Virginia.

Since the company's inception, it has been responsible for building and repairing bridges, as well as constructing culverts and inlets. Currently, the business specializes in the installation of raised pavement markers.

As a U.S. Army veteran, Miller has also used his knowledge and expertise to help his community by serving on the boards of the Huntingdon School Board, First National Bank of Mapleton Bank and the Central Mellon Bank. His philanthropic endeavors have also included the donation of land to the Huntingdon School District, McConnellstown Fire Company and Walker Township.

Pennsylvania Highlands will serve more than 100 full- and part-time students in the fall semester, as well as providing concurrent enrollment programming in all four Huntingdon County school districts through the college's Accelerated College Education program.
